

Students and teachers who get through "The Book" will need to see its value, not just in terms of understanding Orwell's full narrative import, but to see how many of 'Goldstein's ideas' have significant modern parallels. Giving context to the contemporary world we live in gives even greater value to this reading experience and assures students those ideas are permanent and are worthy of their consideration. Students can apply the 'Principles of IngSoc' directly to their own school experience, as many learning institutions have similar authoritarian structures where accountability is elusive and the individual is marginalized.

The following comparison-contrast representations cherry pick the fundamental points of "The Book," locate them in the Signet Edition (1980), and provide, in theory, modern parallels and contexts for Goldstein's assumptions. It would be interesting for students and teachers to add, update, and give macro and micro contexts to the points provided.
